RIGHTS TO REPRESENTATION OR ASSISTANCE

SUBJECT MEMBER RIGHTS TO REPRESENTATION OR ASSISTANCE	
STAGE OF CONDUCT PROCEEDINGS	WHO MAY PROVIDE REPRESENTATION OR ASSISTANCE
Interim Administrative Measures:	
- Temporary Reassignment and/or Suspension	- Private Legal Counsel or Representative - NPF Representative or Legal Counsel
- Stoppage of Pay and Allowances (<i>RCMP Act</i> , s. 22(2)(b))	- Private Legal Counsel or Representative - NPF Representative or Legal Counsel
Investigation	- Private Legal Counsel or Representative - NPF Representative or Legal Counsel
Conduct Meeting	- Private Legal Counsel or Representative - NPF Representative or Legal Counsel
Conduct Board Hearing	- May be represented by and have privileged communications with any person (RCMP Act, s. 47.1(1)(b) and (2)): - Private Legal Counsel or Representative - NPF Representative or Legal Counsel (AM 28.1.10.2) - Another authorized person (non-NPF) under the Commissioner's jurisdiction (General Admin CSOs, s. 8 & 9)

WITNESS MEMBER RIGHTS TO REPRESENTATION OR ASSISTANCE	
STAGE OF CONDUCT PROCEEDINGS	WHO MAY PROVIDE REPRESENTATION OR ASSISTANCE
Conduct Investigation	No statutory right to representation - Private Legal Counsel or Representative - NPF Representative or Legal Counsel CAUTION: For Witness Members, communications with an NPF representative are not protected by any confidentiality privilege (Conduct Policy, s. 15.3)
Giving Evidence at a Conduct Board Hearing	Right to representation (RCMP Act, s. 45.1(3)) by: - Private Legal Counsel or Representative - NPF Representative or Legal Counsel CAUTION: For Witness Members, communications with an NPF representative are not protected by any confidentiality privilege (Conduct Policy, s. 15.3)

Member's Right to Privileged Communications with Their Representative

Communications relating to the conduct process that pass in confidence between a Member and the person who is acting as their representative or assistant are, for the purposes of the *RCMP Act*, privileged as if they were confidential communications passing in professional confidence between the member and their legal counsel (*RCMP Act*, s. 47.1(2); AM 28.1, s. 10.2).

STRATEGY: Members are strongly encouraged to exercise their rights to representation or assistance immediately upon learning that they may be the subject of, or a

witness in, a Code of Conduct investigation.
