

5. Summary of the events leading up to the requirement for counsel

It is important to supply sufficient detail as to allow the decision-maker to determine if you have met the requirements as stated in policy. If the appropriate amount of information is absent, the decision-maker will request further details and this might only delay your application further.

- On 2013-11-09 at 01:16 police received a call from a female security officer to remove an intoxicated female from the [REDACTED] Lodge (flood relief temporary housing Atco Trailers). The female smelled heavily of liquor and was yelling and swearing and was waving her arms in a threatening manner towards security. There are numerous people that reside at this lodge and based on the time of day, making noise, being threatening and intoxicated Security wants her removed. (There is a zero tolerance for alcohol or intoxicated people at the lodge).
- I attended the call and spoke with a male security officer who advised that the female, [REDACTED] had went into unit C14 and was threatening towards the female security officer. The male security officer wanted [REDACTED] removed.
- I was escorted by the male security officer to Unit C14 and knocked on the door. A female answered the door. She said she was not [REDACTED]. There was another female visible on the bed from the doorway who identified herself as [REDACTED].
- [REDACTED] admitted to consuming alcohol but said she did not have any with her. She said she knew she wasn't supposed to be drunk there but "it's ok, I'll just sleep it off."
- I told [REDACTED] she was under arrest for Mischief and advised her that she would be coming with me to the [REDACTED] RCMP detachment but she would not get ready to come with me.
- Backup RCMP [REDACTED] arrived after I tried to convince [REDACTED] to come with me (approximately 5 minutes of trying to convince her to cooperate)
- I again informed [REDACTED] she was under arrest when she would not come on her own. I entered the room and attempted to take her left arm to place in handcuffs. She pulled away and I used soft-control techniques to gain control of her as she went around the back side of the bed. I placed handcuffs on her and she became physically cooperative though was still verbally confrontational. I advised [REDACTED] that she was lucky I was not going to charge her with resisting arrest. [REDACTED] said her arm was hurting.
- Cst. [REDACTED] took control of [REDACTED] and I had no further dealings with her.
- Upon arriving at the detachment I was going to come into cells to assist with [REDACTED] but Cst. [REDACTED] motioned me away to keep the situation de-escalated.
- Security did not want to lay any charges and I made the decision to not lay the resist arrest charge. [REDACTED] was to be released when sober.
- My next shift I was advised that [REDACTED] was released to an ambulance when she was sober and was complaining of a broken arm.
