

Surrey Policing: Wave 5

Methodology


- **Methodology/Sample:** Online and phone survey of randomly-selected sample of 811 adult (18+) Canadians residing in the City of Surrey, BC. Among them, 254 were South Asians, of which 143 are native Punjabi speakers.
 - Online Sample = 509
 - Phone Sample = 302
- Field Window: Wave 5: October 21 to November 4, 2021
 - Previous waves were conducted as follows:

```
Wave 1: January 21 to 31, 2020 | N=800
Wave 2: April 17 to 27, 2020 | N=803
Wave 3: August 11 to 24, 2020 | N=806
Wave 4: January 13 to 26, 2021 | N=802
```

- **Reliability:** Non-probability samples cannot be assigned a margin of error. *As a relative guideline, we have provided margins of error for a probability sample of this size. The margin of error for a probability sample of this size is ± 3.4%, 19 times out of 20.
- **Data has been weighted** by age, gender, ethnicity (South Asian), and balanced between three sub-regions based on postal code groupings, as per the latest census data to be **representative of the adult population in the City of Surrey.**




IMPRESSION & PRIORITIES



Over 4-in-5 of those with an impression are favourable toward RCMP officers


• Favourable impressions of RCMP officers consistent with previous waves






Impressions of Mayor have moved from netfavourable to net-unfavourable since January 2020

• Level of very unfavourable impressions of Mayor McCallum has risen significantly since Wave 1 (January 2020), and by 11% since Wave 4 (January 2021)





Half of respondents say the City of Surrey is on the wrong track





Replacing the RCMP continues to be a low priority for Surrey residents


• Replacing the Surrey RCMP with a municipal police force continues to trail other priorities tested, such as maintaining core services and support for vulnerable citizens, by a substantial margin.





Over 6-in-10 continue to oppose Mayor's plan to replace the RCMP


For four consecutive waves, significant majority oppose the Mayor's Plan to replace the RCMP with a new municipal Surrey Police Service





Over 3-in-5 support a referendum on the mayor's plan to replace the RCMP

Support for a referendum higher among older people. Almost 3-in-5 South Asians support having a referendum.





Strong agreement with reducing unnecessary spending, halting police transition, and delaying implementation

- Over half (54%) strongly agree that transition to replace the RCMP should be "halted" until detailed and full costs are known
- Half (50%) strongly agree that there should be a "line-by-line" overview of police budget



Women (61%) and 55+ (73%) feel most strongly



Post-Test: over 3 in 4 would stay the course or retain RCMP with improvements

- Results are almost identical to first wave in January 2020, with a slight decrease in those choosing "replace the RCMP with a municipal police force"
- Those choosing "we need to replace the RCMP with a municipal police force" declined, moving from 16% to 13%, from wave 4 to wave 5
